

Each generation of leaders passes the torch of progress to the next with the hope of seeing both the continuation and the growth of positive change and greater opportunity for our nation. Young elected officials across the country are now holding that torch, and there is much work to be done. This opening plenary will provide today's young and dynamic agents of change with an inspirational discussion on what it means to be a progressive leader and the important role state and local leaders have in moving an agenda that reflects the values of freedom, fairness and opportunity for all.

THE HONORABLE ELEANOR HOLMES NORTON United States House of Representatives

Eleanor Holmes Norton is now in her tenth term as the Congresswoman for the District of Columbia. Named by President Jimmy Carter as the first woman to chair the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, she came to Congress as a national figure who had been a civil rights and feminist leader.



Norton's work for full congressional voting representation and for full democracy for the

people of the District of Columbia continues her lifelong struggle for universal human rights. Her success in writing bills and getting them enacted has made her one of the most effective legislative leaders in the House. She has the full vote in House committees and serves on the Committee on Homeland Security, the Government Reform Committee, and the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee.

Congresswoman Norton, who taught full time before being elected, continues as a tenured professor of law at Georgetown University, teaching a course there every year. She received her bachelor's degree from Antioch College in Ohio and simultaneously earned her law degree and master's degree in American studies from Yale.

State Level-Foreclosure & Anti-Predatory Lending

Over the past decade, neighborhoods that were once redlined were flooded with high-cost and abusive loans, which were often unaffordable and unsustainable for working class families. The excessive foreclosures of these loans are at the root of the financial crisis, destroying family dreams and threatening neighborhood stability throughout the country. In this session, policy experts will discuss policy options for state legislators who want to reduce and prevent the instances of foreclosures and combat predatory lending in their states.

URIAH KING

CENTER FOR RESPONSIBLE LENDING

Uriah King, vice president of state policy at the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL), coordinates CRL's resources in support of state policymakers and state-based coalitions seeking to address abuses in the financial services market. Additionally, he coordinated CRL's resources in support of several successful legislative campaigns. Prior to CRL, he was a predatory lending specialist at the Miami Valley Fair Housing Center, where he was a lead investigator into predatory

lending practices that led to the filing of several major class actions and dozens of individual suits. He also served as a domestic violence civil protection order advocate and guardian ad litem for abused and neglected children. King graduated magna cum laude from Wright State University, and studied at Cambridge University and Beijing Normal University.

NATHAN NEWMAN

PROGRESSIVE STATES NETWORK

Nathan Newman is executive director for the Progressive States Network. Newman, a lawyer and PhD, has an extensive history of supporting local policy campaigns, from coalition organizing work to drafting legislation. Previous to coming to Progressive States, he was associate counsel at the Brennan Center for Justice, program director of NetAction's Consumer Choice Campaign,

co-director of the University of California, Berkeley Center for Community Economic Research, and a labor and employment lawyer. He received his JD from Yale Law School and his PhD in sociology from the University of California, Berkeley and has written extensively about public policy and the legal system in a range of academic and popular journals.

State Level- The High Cost of Crime and Incarceration: Rethinking the Criminal Justice System

Crime exacts a heavy toll on the communities where it occurs. So, too, does incarceration, which has a heavy financial and social cost. Many states are facing rising prison populations, and with their financial resources diminishing and many communities being seriously affected by crime and recidivism, a drastic rethinking of our criminal justice system is needed. In this session, policy experts and community leaders will discuss restorative justice policies and programs that support smarter and more effective alternatives while saving money, promoting public safety, lowering recidivism, and building stronger communities.

JEREMIAH GRACE

PROGRESSIVE STRATEGIES

Jeremiah Leviticus Grace, one of the youngest commissioners ever elected to the Elizabeth, NJ Board of Education and one of the nation's youngest NAACP Branch presidents, in January 2007 became head of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Jersey's Racial Justice Program allowing him to work full-time on issues such as voting rights, criminal justice, education, and immigration. Grace was later promoted to field manager, where he led the non-legal advocacy at

the ACLU-NJ. Grace founded Progressive Strategies, a public affairs consulting firm geared to providing lobbying, fund-raising, capacity building, strategic planning, and project management for the nonprofit community as well as political campaign services for progressive candidates.

TRACY VELÁZQUEZ

JUSTICE POLICY INSTITUTE

Tracy Velázquez is the executive director of the Justice Policy Institute (JPI), a nonprofit organization focusing on reducing reliance on incarceration and promoting just and effective social policies. JPI published reports, "The Costs of Confinement" and "Pruning Prisons," look at reducing juvenile and adult criminal justice system costs and incarceration rates while improving public safety, and "The Release Valve," reports on Maryland's parole system. While at the Vera Institute

of Justice in New York City, Velázquez worked on criminal justice policy issues, parole reform and improving alternatives to incarceration for drug offenses. She also was the executive director of the Montana Mental Health Association. She has a bachelor's degree from Harvard University and a master's in public administration from Montana State University.

Local Level- Local Economic Development: Building Sustainable Communities

Crystal 6

Local officials promote economic development initiatives to help create sustainable communities – ones where residents of various income levels have the opportunities and tools to build assets, participate in their communities, raise families, engage in business, and become part of the mainstream economy. However, effective and sustainable economic development initiatives must be planned and implemented in a comprehensive way. In this session, economic development experts will present their policy and program recommendations for local level policymakers to help increase family income and wealth, build community assets, and stimulate local economic and workforce development in their communities. Additionally, they will provide information on how YEOs can implement policies that promote fair and equal access to credit, capital, and banking services for low-income and underserved communities.

JAMES CARR

NATIONAL COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT COALITION

James Carr is chief operating officer for the National Community Reinvestment Coalition, an association of 600 local development organizations across the nation, dedicated to improving the flow of capital to communities and promoting economic mobility. He is also a visiting professor at Columbia University in New York and an Executive Committee member of Americans for Financial Reform. Prior to his appointment to NCRC, Carr was senior vice president for financial

innovation, planning and research for the Fannie Mae Foundation and vice president for housing research at Fannie Mae. He has also held posts as assistant director for tax policy with the U.S. Senate Budget Committee, and research associate at the Center for Urban Policy Research at Rutgers University.

KEVIN JORDAN

LOCAL INITIATIVES SUPPORT CORPORATION

Kevin Jordan, the director of family income and wealth-building at the Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC), oversees the company's Centers for Working Families national expansion and is working to formulate LISC's overall family asset building and economic self sufficiency initiative. Jordan has a significant amount of experience in multiple aspects of economic selfsufficiency, including income improvement, asset building, and financial services. Most recently

he served as director of the Working Families Department of the Bon Secours Baltimore Health System, where he developed and managed six family asset building and income support programs. He has a bachelor's degree in psychology from Le Moyne College in Syracuse, NY, and a master's in community planning from the University of Maryland. He is based in LISC's Washington, DC office.

DAVE WOODWARD

OAKLAND COUNTY COMMISSION

Dave Woodward is a county commissioner in Oakland, Michigan where he was born and raised. He served as former chairman to the Oakland County Democratic Party between 2003 and 2009, and was also elected to the Michigan House of Representatives from 1999 to 2004. He is a member of the Center for Progressive Leadership, and is a graduate of Wayne State University where he received a BS in mathematics and a minor in economics. He is president of Oakland Health Plan, Inc., which manages health care services locally for the very poor in Oakland County.

Local Level- Juvenile Justice

SESSION

Research has proven that trying juveniles as adults not only fails to reduce crime, it also has a harmful and long-lasting impact on youth. Recent public opinion polling has shown greater support for policies that work to rehabilitate young offenders. However, the impetus for change must be championed by and come from the local level. Policy experts will discuss with local-level YEOs substantive policy issues and effective messaging around juvenile justice issues. Community practitioners will also educate YEOs on the areas where they can advocate for change and collaborate with their state and federal counterparts to coordinate successful campaigns to reform the juvenile justice system.

ABIGAIL ANDERSON

CONNECTICUT JUVENILE JUSTICE ALLIANCE

Abby Anderson joined the Connecticut Juvenile Justice Alliance as a senior policy associate in September 2004 and became executive director in October 2007. She has a track record of success in juvenile justice reform in Connecticut and has steadily gained the respect of state agencies and other key stakeholders and partners. Anderson also serves as a commissioner for the Connecticut Commission on Children. She holds a master's degree in nonprofit management from Regis University.

ERIN DAVIES

CAMPAIGN FOR YOUTH JUSTICE

Erin Davies joined the Campaign for Youth Justice in March 2008. During the 2006 primary and run-off elections, Chavis served as finance director for

Congressman Hank Johnson (D A 4th) and was responsible for tracking more than \$500,000 in campaign funds. She also worked for former Congresswoman Denise Majette (D-GA 4th), gaining expertise in congressional politics and constituent services.

As a coordinator of the Business/Pulpit Forum Work Group, he helped convene a cross-section of leaders who helped resolve a nationwide boycott of Kmart that involved 170 arrests for civil disobedience. Thigpen testified before the Greensboro Truth and Reconciliation Commission (created to review a 1979 violent conflict between Communist Workers Party and Nazi/Klan members that led to the deaths

of five community organizers). He is conducting research for his book, Generation NOW-Young Elected Leaders in a New Era of American Politics. He has BA and BS degrees in political science and justice and policy studies, respectively, from Guilford College and a master's degree in public affairs from University of North Carolina, Greensboro.

WOMEN OF WILL

Rhonda Briggins-Ridley is a professional political trainer and the co-founder of Women of Will (WOW), an organization that focuses on empowering and uplifting women. Her introduction to politics as a youth and her participation in the 21st Century Youth Leadership program in Selma, Alabama helped her cultivate an extensive career in politics including managing and supporting several congressional, state, and local campaigns. Currently, Briggins-Ridley serves as the senior

director of external affairs for the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority (MARTA). She previously served on the cabinet of Alabama's governor as his director of community relations. She also serves as the southern political strategy advisor for the White House Project (WHP).

Lunch Plenary 12:20 PM - 1:20 PM

Drug Reform Policy

The war on drugs is unsustainable in both fiscal and human terms. It has proven remarkably ineffective in controlling drug use, even as its costs and negative consequences have mounted. The United States ranks first in the world in per capita incarceration rates, with less than 5 percent of the world's population, but nearly 25 percent of the world's prison population. Almost two million people are arrested each year for violating a drug law. The number of people incarcerated for drug law violations has increased from 50,000 in 1980 to over 500,000 today. The drug war's other consequences include broken families, striking racial injustices, erosion of civil liberties, increasing overdose fatalities and tens of billions of dollars wasted annually on ineffective policies. Few government policies have failed for so long without any serious effort to question or revise them.

The tide, however, is beginning to turn, with state legislatures and even Congress proposing and enacting meaningful reforms – in some cases following in the footsteps of successful ballot initiative campaigns. Dr. Ethan Nadelmann has played a leadership role both in articulating a new vision for dealing with drugs inside the United States and globally, and in building a nascent political movement to ground drug policies in science, compassion, health, and human rights. During this plenary, he will discuss with young elected officials how drug policy reform presents an opportunity to simultaneously improve public policies, elevate public debate, save taxpayer dollars, reduce pain and suffering, mobilize young people, and advance basic rights and liberties.

DR. ETHAN NADELMANN

DRUG POLICY ALLIANCE

Ethan Nadelmann is the founder and executive director of the Drug Policy Alliance, the leading organization in the United States advocating for drug policies grounded in science, compassion, health, and human rights. Nadelmann was born in New York City, received his BA, JD, and PhD from Harvard, as well as a M.Sc. in International Relations from the London School of Economics, and then taught politics and public affairs at Princeton University from 1987 to 1994. He has

authored two books on international criminal law enforcement - Cops Across Borders and (with Peter Andreas) Policing the Globe – as well as many dozens of articles on drug policy. Described by Rolling Stone as "the point man" for drug policy reform efforts, Ethan Nadelmann is widely regarded as a principal proponent of drug policy reform both in the United States and abroad.

States are coming together to fix the Electoral College. The National Popular Vote bill has been introduced in all 50 states, has the support of 75 percent of the public, and solves a major problem in presidential elections. Once adopted by enough states, the National Popular Vote bill will make every vote equal, make every vote meaningful, and guarantee that the presidential candidate with the most votes wins the election. This session will provide a discussion of the National Popular Vote effort and how YEOs can get involved in this effort in their own states.

CHRISTOPHER PEARSON

NATIONAL POPULAR VOTE

Christopher Pearson has been organizing with National Popular Vote since its beginning in 2006, where he coordinates Eastern states for the project. From 2006-2008 Pearson served in the Vermont House of Representatives where he led the House Progressive Caucus. He served on the House Government Operations Committee and was recognized by the Vermont State Employees Association as the Legislator of the Year in 2007. Before serving in the Vermont House he worked

at FairVote and for former Congressman Bernie Sanders (I-VT). He graduated from the University of Vermont in 1995 with a degree in psychology.

1:30 PM - 2:45 PM Human Rights and Equality

Since our country's inception, we have struggled to make the phrase "all men are created equal" a reality for every American. Each group's fight for equality is part of the greater struggle for human rights for all – it is everyone's struggle. A panel of YEOs and advocates will lead a discussion on the overarching national issues of anti-bullying, LGBT equality, and hate crimes, as well as the state and local legislation that can be implemented to put an end to the cycle of discrimination.

MARK FERRANDINO

COLORADO HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Representative Mark Ferrandino was first elected to the Colorado House of Representatives to fill a vacancy in 2007. He was re-elected in 2008 with roughly 80 percent of the vote, in both the primary and general election. Ferrandino graduated with a master's in public policy analysis and a BA in political science and economics, both from the University of Rochester. Representative Ferrandino lives in the Baker neighborhood of Denver with his partner Greg and their dog Dagny.

MICHAEL LIEBERMAN

ANTI-DEFAMATION LEAGUE

Michael Lieberman, the Washington counsel for the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) and the director of the League's Civil Rights Policy Planning Center, helps coordinate ADL's involvement in legislative initiatives and helps develop and implement ADL policy positions on a variety of domestic and international affairs. Before joining ADL, Lieberman served as legislative assistant and counsel in Washington to former Representative Dan Glickman, who served as the Secretary

of Agriculture in the Clinton administration. He also worked for former Representative Tony Hall (D-OH). Lieberman received his BA in Judaic studies and international relations from the University of Michigan and his law degree from Duke University where he served as a member of the Duke Law Journal and editor-in-chief of the Duke International and Comparative Law Institute.

Immigration Reform

SESSION

We are a nation of immigrants. Since before our nation's founding, newcomers have made lasting positive contributions to our society. Nevertheless, immigration has often been a controversial issue, inseparable from racial, religious, and ethnic prejudice. Certain periods of our nation's history have been marked by significant anti-immigrant sentiment and legislation, and forces on the Right are once again ginning up the same old fears and hate. YEOs can counter their demagoguery and make lasting, significant, and progressive change. While this is a national issue, policy shifts at the state and local level have a significant impact on the lives of immigrants. In this session, a panel of immigration policy experts will share local and state policies that encourage integration, promote economic justice and growth, and protect the rights of immigrants of all nationalities.

AFTON BRANCHE

DRUM MAJOR INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC POLICY

Afton Branche joined the Drum Major Institute in February 2009 as an immigration researcher focusing on federal, state, and local immigration policy. In particular, her research examines the shared economic interests of immigrants and the American middle class. Her report, "The Next Economic Imperative: Counting Undocumented Immigrants in the 2010 Census," has been highlighted in The American Prospect and Newsday, and her writing has appeared in The Atlanta

Journal-Constitution and Open Left. Branche graduated from Georgetown University with a BS in foreign service in 2008. She majored in culture and politics with a focus on international development, and received a certificate in African studies. While in Washington, DC, she worked with Vital Voices Global Partnership, focusing on global women's leadership initiatives and grant management.

REBECCA HEADEN

RIGHTS WORKING GROUP

Rebecca Headen is the national fellow at the Rights Working Group, where she is responsible for coordinating the Racial Profiling: Face the Truth campaign. Previously, she worked with the ACLU of North Carolina, as the Racial Justice Project staff attorney focused on racial profiling, immigrants' rights, and the school to prison pipeline. Prior to becoming an attorney, she worked for the Maine State Attorney General's Civil Rights Unit and later for the ACLU National Cam-

paign Against Racial Profiling, where she contributed to public education resources on "traditional" and "post-9/11" racial profiling.

SUMAN RAGHUNATHAN

PROGRESSIVE STATES NETWORK

Suman Raghunathan has deep experience advancing immigrant rights via grassroots, advocacy, and policy organizations. The daughter of Indian immigrants and the former interim executive director of Chhaya Community Development Corporation, where she now serves on the Board of Directors, Raghunathan's expertise lies in crafting policy platforms and advocacy strategies. She has also developed programs to engage immigrants in the electoral process at the NY Immigra-

tion Coalition and OneAmerica, including managing the nation's largest voter registration project for new citizens. Most recently, she was an immigration policy consultant, developing progressive policy agendas for Demos and the Drum Major Institute. Raghunathan holds a bachelor's degree in international relations from Brown University and a master's in nonprofit management from Milano, The New School for Management and Urban Policy.

Corporate Personhood? A Discussion of Citizens United & Corporate Speech Rights

Recently, the Supreme Court decided in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission to reverse its decades-old decision in Austin v. Michigan Chamber of Commerce (1990), which upheld a state law's restriction on the independent expenditure of funds from a corporation's general treasury for political speech. In overturning that precedent, the Citizens United majority held that "the Government may not suppress political speech" of corporations and found that "[n]o sufficient governmental interest justifies limits on the political speech of nonprofit or for-profit corporations." Some believe that the majority's decision is an important victory for the First Amendment and that the Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act of 2002 was an unconstitutional restriction of political speech. Others believe that the decision grants corporations the same political speech rights as individuals and represents an outrageous misinterpretation of the First Amendment. In either case, the Court ruled for the first time that governmental restrictions on independent expenditures from corporate general treasury accounts are invalid and unconstitutional and, at the very least, the decision has made it possible for corporations to wield extraordinary influence on elections at all levels in our country. The session will discuss the implications of the decision, the majority's interpretation of the First Amendment, and the expansion of corporate personhood jurisprudence and its impact.

MARGE BAKER

PEOPLE FOR THE AMERICAN WAY

Marge Baker has worked for nearly 35 years in various public service roles. She is currently executive vice president for policy and programs at People For the American Way, a non-profit advocacy organization working to protect core constitutional values under attack from the far right. Prior to her current position she was the staff director for the late Senator Paul Wellstone on the Senate's Employment, Safety and Training Subcommittee. Baker is a graduate of Yale Law

School, has served as a law clerk in the federal judiciary, as a counsel on the Senate Judiciary Committee, and as head of consumer protection for a state regulatory agency. Baker is married, and has three children, ages 24, 26, and 29.

JEFFREY CLEMENTS

FREE SPEECH FOR PEOPLE

Jeff Clements founded Clements Law Office, LLC in 2009. He served for many years as an assistant attorney general and chief of the Public Protection & Advocacy Bureau in Massachusetts, as a partner in the Boston law firms of Mintz Levin and Clements & Clements, LLP, and as a trial lawyer handling public interest and private litigation matters. He filed a Supreme Court amicus brief on behalf of several citizens in Citizens United v. Federal Elections Commission. Following

the decision, he helped found Free Speech for People and serves as its general counsel. Clements graduated with distinction in history and government from Colby College in 1984, and magna cum laude with a concentration in public law from the Cornell Law School in 1988.

JAMIE ELDRIDGE

Massachusetts State Senate

Senator Jamie Eldridge has served the Middlesex and Worcester Districts in Central Massachusetts since January 2009. He previously served as state representative for the 37th Middlesex District, after being the only "Clean Elections" candidate to win public office in Massachusetts's history. As a legislator, he led and supported initiatives to protect marriage equality in Massachusetts, and to close corporate tax loopholes. He proposed and passed the state's newest anti-poverty

program and was part of an effort to overhaul the way education is financed in Massachusetts, resulting in more state education aid for local communities. Senator Eldridge advocates for campaign and ethics reform, increased environmental protections, and universal access to health care. He is a graduate of Johns Hopkins University, and Boston College Law School.

Debbie Liu is the general counsel of People For the American Way and People For the American Way Foundation. In that capacity, she serves as the legal advisor to both organizations, and their Boards of Directors, and advises and trains the staff on guidelines and rules for 501(c)(3) and (c) (4) organizations. Ms. Liu also provides analysis of laws, legislation, regulations, and judicial decisions affecting non-profit advocacy and core issues of the organizations, including, among other

things, the First Amendment, civil liberties, voting rights, and LGBT equality. She also has the primary responsibility of ensuring that the organizations are in compliance with relevant tax and election laws, and she oversees compliance and proper reporting by PFAW's connected federal PAC, PFAW Voters Alliance, and its 527 organization, PFAW Action Fund. Previous to joining People For in 2003, Liu served as assistant general counsel to the NAACP National Office in Baltimore, MD.

KAITLIN SOPOCI-BELKNAP

DISTRICT BOARD PRESIDENT, EUREKA, CALIFORNIA

Water Board President Kaitlin Sopoci-Belknap was elected to the Humboldt Bay Municipal Water District Board in 2004. She is the first woman and youngest person to serve on the District Board. She is the director of a local organization dedicated to growing democracy at the grassroots level and protecting local control over resources. She attended Hampshire College in rural Massachusetts for three years where she studied education and community. After moving to Eureka, she graduated from New College of California in Santa Rosa.

From Cradle to College: Keys to Providing a Complete and Equitable Education for All Students

When President Obama addressed the schoolchildren of our nation, he urged them to take responsibility for their education and to stay in school. He encouraged them to find what they're good at, and explained that what they make of their education not only determines what they make of their future, but also the future of America. Many children in our public school system must overcome incredible obstacles and hardships in order to succeed, but as President Obama poignantly explained, "Where you are right now doesn't have to determine where you'll end up. No one's written your destiny for you, because here in America, you write your own destiny. You make your own future." However, elected leaders can play a large role in ensuring that each student has an equal chance to succeed, and a strong and equitable educational foundation.

This can be done by adopting an "Opportunity to Learn" framework for education policy, which focuses on ensuring that resources are provided for all students to have an equal opportunity to learn and achieve. Granted, education equity is very much tied into the bigger issues of community and state economies, intergenerational poverty, the prison pipeline, and the civil rights implications of the achievement gap; however, during this session Dr. John Jackson will provide young elected officials with a powerful "Opportunity to Learn" communications and policy framework with which to build bipartisan support and engage the business community, faith leaders, and parents in the critical issue of public education. Additionally, the U.S. Department of Education will provide a response regarding current federal education policy, as well as the resources the department can provide to elected officials.

DR. JOHN H. JACKSON

THE SCHOTT FOUNDATION FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

As President and CEO of The Schott Foundation for Public Education, Dr. John H. Jackson leads the Foundation's efforts to ensure a high quality public education for all students, regardless of race or gender. Dr. Jackson joined the Schott Foundation after seven productive years in leadership positions at the NAACP, having served as the Chief Policy Officer and National Director of Education. He has also served as an Adjunct Professor of Race, Gender, and Public Policy at the

Georgetown Public Policy Institute. In 1999, President William Jefferson Clinton appointed Dr. Jackson to serve in his administration as Senior Policy Advisor in the Office for Civil Rights (OCR) at the U.S. Department of Education. Most recently, Jackson served on the Obama-Biden transition team as a member of the President's 13-member Education Policy Transition Work Group. Jackson possesses a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Xavier University of Louisiana; a Master of Education in Education Policy from the University of Illinois' College of Education; and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Illinois' College of Law. In addition, Dr. Jackson received a Master of Education and Doctorate of Education in Administration, Planning, and Social Policy from the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

ROBERT M. SHIREMAN

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Robert Shireman is the deputy under secretary at the U.S. Department of Education, and has played a leading role in the Obama Administration's efforts to simplify the federal financial aid application process, to strengthen program integrity and consumer protection, to develop strategies to increase college completion, and to improve the reliability and reach of federal grants, loans and other college aid. Shireman worked for President Clinton in the 1990s for two years,

and before that for U.S. Senator Paul Simon (IL) for seven years. Before joining the Department of Education in February 2009, Shireman was president and founder of a California nonprofit, the Institute for College Access and Success, whose leadership brought public attention to the issue of rising student debt, prompting Congress to adopt income-based repayment for federal loans. Shireman earned a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of California at Berkeley, and master's degrees from the University of San Francisco and the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

While the American economy is beginning to experience moderate growth as we work ourselves out of the worst financial crisis since the Great Depression, jobs have been far too slow to return. The number of Americans unemployed or underemployed has reached over 27 million, making job creation and workforce development critically important. Policymakers should not despair of encouraging new job creation during a recession: the seeds of future innovation and growth are often sown during recessions, as failures from the previous boom are analyzed and new ventures are launched. This session will focus on effective job creation strategies for both states and cities, with specific examples of state and local legislation from communities around the country.

Nathan Newman is executive director for the Progressive States Network. Newman, a lawyer and PhD, has an extensive history of supporting local policy campaigns, from coalition organizing work to drafting legislation. Revenue Restructuring and Reform

Crystal 3

The longest, deepest national recession since the Great Depression has caused record-breaking drop-offs in state and local revenues. The cruel irony is that just as people's needs are rising dramatically, the resources available to meet those needs are shrinking. Over-reliance on spending cuts offer people less of what they need, severely damage state and local economies in ways that threaten recovery, and significantly reduce investments in future prosperity. A more balanced approach recognizes there is no single way to tackle a problem this big. It makes the case that helping families that are struggling takes precedence over inflexible policies that put a small-government ideology over practical problem-solving. This session will discuss the drawbacks of relying too heavily on reductions in spending, local and state case studies, specific revenue increases that make sense, and tips on how to "talk taxes" in a way that helps shape the debate and win public approval.

JOE MAREANE

TOMPKINS COUNTY, New YORK

Joe Mareane is the county administrator of Tompkins County (Ithaca), NY, where he is charged with managing a \$156 million budget and 750-person workforce engaged in services that range from home health care to snowplowing. Prior to coming to Tompkins County, Mr. Mareane served as chief fiscal officer for Onondaga County (Syracuse), where he managed the County's \$1.3 billion budget and was involved in most major projects and policy initiatives undertaken by the

County. He holds a master's degree in public administration from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University and a BA degree from Indiana University-Purdue University at Fort Wayne. Mr. Mareane has been married to his wife, Amy, for 35 years and has three grown children.

JON SHURE

CENTER FOR BUDGET AND POLICY PRIORITIES

Jon Shure is deputy director of the State Fiscal Project at the Center for Budget and Policy Priorities. He founded the New Jersey Policy Perspective in 1997 and served 12 years as president. Energy and Environment

Americans represent five percent of the world's population but produce more than 40 percent of the world's landfill waste, carbon emissions, greenhouse gases, and other environmental threats. More audiences want to be actively engaged in the effort to decrease dependence on fossil fuels, seriously address water issues, and adopt the standards for livable and sustainable communities – urban and rural, large and small. This type of effort impacts virtually every market sector and requires a new type of elected official – one who is more informed about sustainability, willing to make it a priority, and who understands the revenue and jobs attached to it. This session will examine the policies and practices that can be adopted by cities, states, and other public entities to help combat climate change and build a long-term sustainable community. Additionally, it will help YEOs map out the tools to address these issues, establish their credibility on the issues in various communities, and leverage business, funding sources for municipal projects and services, and the projected 2-3 million green job opportunities.

CAROLINE TOWN COUNCIL



Redistricting for Fair Representation

Following the 2010 Census, all 435 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives will be reapportioned among the fifty states, and boundaries for congressional, state, and local legislatives districts will be redrawn. These redrawn electoral districts must comply with various legal requirements and will directly impact the preservation and expansion of minority electoral opportunities. In many areas, these opportunities depend on districts containing a sufficient number of minority voters to form a strong voting block. This session will discuss redistricting for fair representation and explain the redistricting process and the legal standards for congressional, legislative, and local governing bodies. The session will also address technical and logistical elements of redrawing districts.

ANTHONY FAIRFAX

CENSUSCHANNEL, LLC

Anthony E. Fairfax, a geodemographic consultant for a variety of public and private organizations and president of CensusChannel LLC, is an expert in the development of redistricting plans and developed over 300 plans for jurisdictions ranging from small towns to large congressional districts. He provided redistricting and geographic information systems training at several universities as well as technical services as a non-testifying expert for four court cases, including

renowned redistricting Supreme Court case, Shaw v. Reno. Fairfax published two books, A Step-by-Step Guide to Using Census 2000 Data (2004) and The Democratic Trend Phenomenon (2008). He holds a BS degree in electrical engineering from Virginia Tech and resides in Hampton, VA with his wife, Dr. Colita Nichols Fairfax, and has two daughters, Layla and Natalie.

ALLISON RIGGS






RAQUEL E. SIMON-PETLEY

Planned Parenthood often is the only source of family planning for a large proportion of the women we serve.

When it comes to sex ed, honesty is the best policy.

Over 100 leading scientific and medical groups in the United States recommend that young people receive accurate and honest sex education that includes information about both abstinence and contraception. That's because doctors understand that knowledge is power in the fight against teen pregnancy, STDs and HIV. Yet, the United States has spent more than \$1.5 billion on abstinence-only-until-marriage programs whose "efficacy may approach zero" according to a study by the Society for Adolescent Medicine. A 2004Congressional report found that 80% of these programs contain medically false or misleading information. Research shows that teenagers who receive information about both abstinence and contraception are more likely to delay sexual activity, have fewer partners and use condoms and contraception when they do become sexually active. That's why 88% of parents support sex education that includes information about both abstinence and contraception.

As a young elected official, you have the chance to ensure that America's youth receive the honest, evidence-based sex education they deserve. Let's give teens *all* the facts.

Support evidence-based, comprehensive sex education. It works.



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Over the last 10 years, the U.S. has spent more than \$1.5 billion on abstinence-only-until-marriage programs. In that time, America's youth acquired nearly 9.1 million STD's each year.


Research has shown — over and over again that abstinence-only programs simply don't work.

- 1999 The American Medical Association issues a statement opposing abstinence-only education.
- The Institute of Medicine calls for the elimination of 2000 abstinence-only programs.
- 2004 Rep. Henry Waxman releases a report showing that 80% of federally funded abstinence-only programs contain "false and misleading" information.
- 2006 The Society for Adolescent Medicine issues a statement calling abstinence-only scientifically and ethically flawed and cites efficacy at "near zero".
- 2007 A long-term, congressionally mandated scientific evaluation finds that abstinence-only programs have no impact on sexual behavior.
- 2008 The House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform holds a hearing in which scientific evidence and expert testimony demonstrate - again - that abstinence-only programs simply do not work.
- 2009 President Obama ends federal abstinence-only funding.
- 2010 The final health care reform bill restores \$250 million in funding for Title V abstinence-only programs.

Oppose failed abstinence-only-until-marriage programs in your community. Support evidence-based, comprehensive sex education. It works.



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
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GOING GREEN
